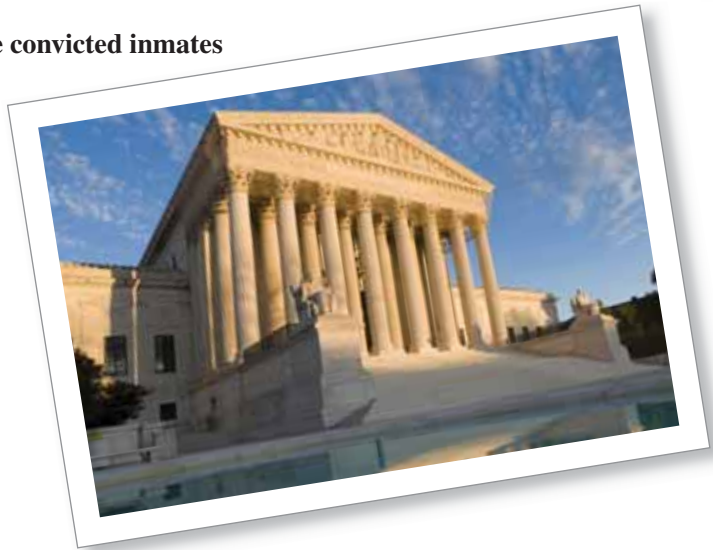
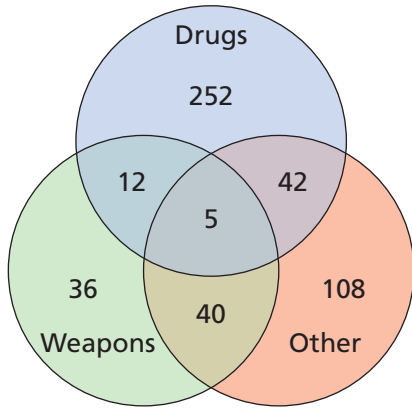

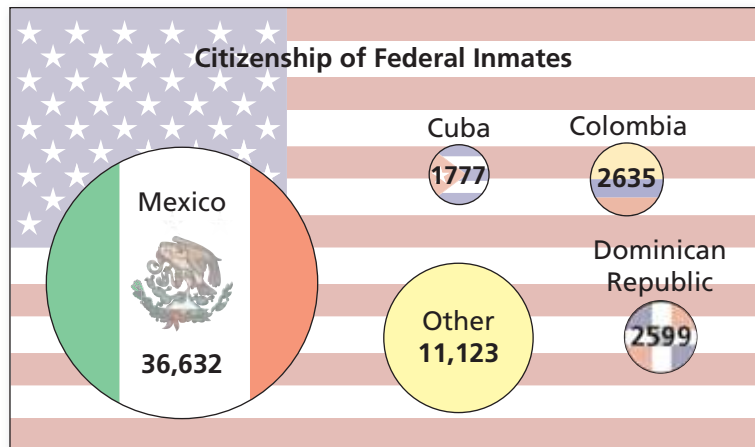
Convictions The set diagram shows the offenses of the convicted inmates at a prison. In Exercises 1–3, use the set diagram.



United States citizens have the right to appeal a conviction. Appeals are handled through appellate courts, but on rare occasions they can make it to the Supreme Court of the United States.

- How many of the inmates were convicted of drug offenses?
- How many of the inmates were convicted of weapons offenses *and* “other” offenses?
- How many of the inmates were convicted of drug offenses *or* weapons offenses?

- Federal Inmates** There are 209,770 inmates in the U.S. federal prison system. The inmates are classified as citizens of the United States, Mexico, Colombia, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, or other. How many federal inmates are citizens of the United States?



Rights of Accused In Exercises 5–7, use a set diagram to analyze the statement about crime.

- All defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty.
- Some people have been convicted of crimes they did not commit.
- Habeas corpus is a safeguard of individual freedom stating that no person can be jailed without being charged with a crime.
- Sixth Amendment** Part of the Sixth Amendment states, “In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial.” Use a set diagram to visualize the negation of this amendment.
